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From the Chair:

Before I introduce the excellent work ELREC is doing for the community, I will give you an update on the case relating to the unfair withdrawal of ELREC's funding by Edinburgh Council.

It is nearly five month since ELREC's funding was withdrawn and given to another organisation that has since asked ELREC for help. Because ELREC complained to the Council that some of its officers "lied" to recommend the withdrawal of ELREC's funding, a second investigation is being carried out



by a senior officer of the Council. ELREC worked well with this investigating officer and although ELREC agrees with her observations of unacceptable practice, ELREC believes that these unacceptable practices relate to "lying" and has asked for evidence relating to the investigating officer's conclusions and has requested that a mediator should be appointed. This is now being carried out by the Council.

In summary, the investigating officer's report contains the following statements: One officer that earlier "apologised" for "confusion" instead of "lying", offered to "apologise" again but ELREC refused this meaningless gesture. The investigating officer also used the word "confusion" to explain 'unacceptable actions' of offices. ELREC has not accepted this attempt by the investigating officer to state that officers were 'incompetent' but did not 'deliberately lie'. ELREC believes that these unacceptable actions of the officers were deliberate and included "lying".

Some of the 'unacceptable actions' reported by the investigating officer were: "better practice" was required, various issues were "extremely confusing", "more professional manner" was required and "processes that have been referenced or cited during my investigation are not of a sufficiently high standard or robust and transparent enough". There were "no written record", "different words have been used interchangeably" to describe committee structures that did not exist and there was "inadequate guidance and firm parameters". In addition, there was a lack of "formal remit" and lack of "clear, agreed communication channels with a written audit trail of decisions".

ELREC requested the legally required Equality and Rights Impact Assessment (ERIA) form, which officers said was carried out in 2014. The first form sent to ELREC contained anomalous 2015 information in an ERIA dated 2014. This ERIA was written in 2015, so was the second 'corrected' ERIA form which was also dated 2014. Despite this attempt to mislead, the investigating officer stated that, "I do believe that this (not sure which?) ERIA would have benefited from your (ELREC's) involvement and should have engaged a wider group of people than it did". This damning statement sums up how officers of the Council disregarded the law and the Human rights of the members of ELREC and the Human rights of other people in the community. This action of the Council officers and EaRN (Equality and Rights Network) members, who produced the ERIA form, should reflect on the 'truthfulness' of the statement they made, that their ERIA "Recommendations are proportionate and will be delivered".

The investigating officer stated that since ELREC's Board members and officers were selected as dictated by ELREC's constitution no further investigation was required in this matter.

Although two officers of the Council said they did not know that a related Board meeting was being recorded, available evidence indicated that they did know.

ELREC will continue to inform you of the developments in this case. Mediation is the next stage.

In general: ELREC is functioning well. This is due to the excellent commitments of its staff and volunteers. Significant funding from the Lottery, funding from the Government and the Robertson's Trust have helped ELREC to continue working in partnership and to develop areas of work which will benefit the community.

ELREC has just appointed a new Project Lead Officer/Fundraiser, Dr Elisabetta Spano MSc. She will use her research experience and skills to develop and improve the work that ELREC does for the community. She also has a fund raising role. This is important because despite losing its funding from the Council, ELREC continues to work with the police and has recently helped the NHS to stage a community health meeting in Edinburgh, even though ELREC was excluded from the Council's ERIA assessment. That the organisation that received ELREC's funding from the Council has asked for help from ELREC indicates that the Equality Impact of advising the Council to remove ELREC's funding was not assessed "proportionately" by those who carried out the flawed ERIA for the Council.

ELREC's staff, volunteers and others have again contributed to this newsletter. Please read what we are doing and, you are welcome to join us in all of our activities. Finally, I would like to thank all those who helped ELREC to raise significant funds recently to help those who suffered in the recent Earthquakes in Nepal.

A Report: Festival of Politics – 2015. Scotland and Slavery.

On the 14th August, the first event of the Festival of Politics was held in the debating chamber of the Scottish Parliament. An almost capacity audience attended.

Professor Sir Tom Devine, Scotland's principal historian lectured on the real role of Scots in the British slave trade and what was the legacy. The Presiding Officer of the Parliament, Rt Hon Tricia Marwick MSP chaired the event successfully.

The Panellists were Professor Sir Geoff Palmer, Emeritus Professor Heriot Watt University and Honorary President of ELREC; Ms Louise Welsh, author and collaborator with regard to the Empire Café 2014 Commonwealth Games Project in Glasgow and Stephen Mullen, an historian from Glasgow University.

After outlining the extensive but 'hidden' history of Scotland's connections with British slavery in the Caribbean in the 18th and 19th centuries, Sir Tom concluded that the financial benefits which Scotland gained from its involvement in this slavery were significant and contributed to the industrial and economic development of Scotland which occurred during the industrial revolution.

During the debate Professor Palmer demonstrated that Scotland's involvement in this slavery is still visible. For example: The Gallery of Modern Art in Glasgow which was a slave master's house. On a lesser scale, but no less important, were...24 Forth Street, 13 Gilmore Place, Harmony House and Inveresk Lodge. All the owners of these properties owned slaves: The Necropolis in Glasgow was built by a slave owner so were the Academies of Bathgate, Dollar and Inverness: Jamaica Street in Glasgow was built in 1763 to trade in sugar and coffee from

Jamaica: Perth made linen clothes for slaves and Killearn was rebuilt by Blackburn who was a slave owner in Jamaica. Many place names in Scotland bear the names of famous slave owners such as Grant, Campbell, Gladstone, Baillie, Buchanan, Speirs, Wedderburn, Ewing and Oswald: Dundas (Lord Melville), whose stature stands in St Andrew Square in Edinburgh, was the powerful politician that stopped Wilberforce from abolishing the slave trade for 15 years: Oswald's grand house (Oswald Hall) remains in Auchincruive, Ayrshire. He and the Grants were partners in the buying and selling of slaves but he was selected by the British government to negotiate the Paris Peace settlement in 1783 which included Benjamin Franklin and future presidents of the United States, after the defeat of the French in the naval battle for Jamaica in 1782. At that time, the free

labour of about 250,000, often rebellious, Jamaican slaves provided Britain with more than half of its income from its empire. Oswald confirmed the independence of the USA and retained Canada for the British Empire rather that giving it to the USA. France was given Senegal. Scotland owned a greater proportion of slaves than any of the other nations in Britain. Therefore, it is not surprising that young men like the great poet Robert Burns made plans to sail to Jamaica to work as slave masters to become rich like other Scots had done. Thankfully, for the sake of his poetry, Burns did not sail.

Associated with this seeking of money to improve personal wealth and the wealth of Scotland, was the development a black (non-white) Scottish Diaspora in the Caribbean during slavery and after British slavery was abolished in 1838. These Scots, by descent, were not invited to past Scottish

Diaspora Gatherings but greater political and historical awareness have change past attitudes and now the non-white Scottish Diaspora, who have Scottish surnames and genes which will not disappear, is now an important part of such Gatherings in Scotland.

The audience raised various point such as: There are still slaves in the world. Professor Palmer agreed that this is a terrible evil but evils should be addressed not compared. Comparison tends to reduce one evil and elevate the other. Professor Palmer and Professor Devine pointed out that the

slavery being discussed at this event was chattel slavery where legally, a slave had no right to life and was 'property'. That is why slave owners were given £20Million (£17 Billion in today's money) as compensation for their 'property' at the end of slavery (at Emancipation) in 1833 - 1834. Another member of the audience said that Scotland's awareness of this history was limited by the fact that

few descendants of this slavery lived in Scotland. However, Professor Palmer said that evil deeds should be acknowledged and addressed even if the victim has no voice to protest. He quoted a short sentence from a previously unknown historical letter he discovered while working at the Heriot Watt University. This letter was written by Gibson-Craig, the MP for Midlothian in 1838, whose family owned the Riccarton Estate, where the Heriot Watt University is now based. Gibson-Craig told his father in his 1838 letter that the vote to end British slavery was 96 to 93 for this particular vote. Most of the MPs deliberately did not vote. Total abolition of slavery was not a popular cause. However, Gibson-Craig, with great courage, stated to his father..."I voted with the majority (for abolition) and would do so again". This kind of goodness and dignity does not need to hear the voices of victims to act justly and fairly on their behalf.

The Presiding Officer closed this successful event by suggesting that those who stated that Scotland should help the development of Caribbean countries that helped Scotland's development in the past should write to MSPs who would take appropriate action. The general view was that this historical approach to

politics was another fruitful way of developing good race relations.

Dear all,

I am delighted to join ELREC as the new Project Lead Officer/Fundraiser and to give my contribution to the excellent job that the organisation has been doing for years.

I was born in Cagliari, the main city in Sardinia, Italy, where I lived for a good part of my life. I graduated in Political Science in my hometown university, and afterwards I achieved my Postgraduate degree in International Relations, with a thesis on the development of democracy in Botswana. In 2008 I moved to Scotland to study first for an MSc by Research and then for a PhD, both at the Centre of African Studies at the



university of Edinburgh. My PhD thesis was qualitative, focusing on different migration movements from apartheid South Africa to Botswana and the related issues of the liberation struggle, questions of citizenship and transnational connections. ELREC's Cycle for Nepal Challenge

On 25 April 2015, a massive earthquake with a magnitude of 7.8 hit Nepal, killing more than 9,000 people and injuring over 23,000. The April 2015 Nepal earthquake, or 'Gorkha earthquake' has devastated the mountainous Asian state- destroying crucial infrastructure, such as key transport lines, hospitals, health centres, schools and countless homes. In the worst natural disaster to strike Nepal since the 1934 Nepal- Bikar earthquake, 2.8 million have been displaced leaving hundreds of thousands of families homeless, without access to basic supplies, such as safe drinking water, food or shelter.

Compelled to do something to help various members of the Nepalese community in Edinburgh, the Nepal Scotland Association and the Edinburgh and Lothians Regional Equality Council (ELREC) decided to take a stand, or more accurately, a pedal, to raise money for the already poor nation of Nepal, and its people in these very difficult times.



The result? The ELREC Cycles for

Nepal Challenge: a 20-mile charity cycle ride from central Edinburgh to Balerno and back to raise much-needed funds for the Nepal Scotland Association to assist in the reconstruction of schools and homes destroyed by the earthquake.

On 9 August, thirty people of varying ages and backgrounds accepted the challenge and took to their bikes to support Nepali victims, while a handful of supporters followed on foot. On the beautiful summer's day, the path along the Water of Leith through Dean Village rang to the excitement and dedication felt by participants.

One of the dedicated cyclists I had the opportunity to speak with was twenty-two year old Manish Khatri, a fourth year Computing student and Campus Officer at Napier university who, upon discovering the news of the terrible earthquake decided to travel to Nepal for two months to help. Manish explains that "I knew that my family and friends back in Nepal were OK but I couldn't stop thinking about the ones that weren't, and the ways I could help them if I was in the field". He decided to use his university, work, friends and family connections to raise as much money as possible under the Nepal Scotland Association (NSA) and send a work team to Nepal. Manish and his friend Ashis Pun travelled to Nepal on their own pocket so they could use their NSA funding to assist those in the most affected areas, including the village where Manish grew up:

"When we were going around the affected areas for the first time, my hands and legs were shaking, my eyes started watering as the streets that I used to walk were not same, the monuments, the temple and the school were all destroyed."





While in the field Manish and his team slept outside in tents, "and had to keep running every night when there was a little shake". Despite this, they were involved in fifteen different projects. Manish decided however to use his own savings to help his village of Dhading as opposed to using the NSA funding, because the way he saw it, his village might have been destroyed but it still had many capable people that could help. In that spirit Manish bought mosquito nets for 206 homes, construction tools for schools and houses, and provided money and staple food ingredients for the elderly in Dhading. Additionally, the team took on a project in Manbu, neighboring Barpak, which is near the epicentre of the earthquake, in one of the most remote areas of Gurkha. The project was to help rebuild the school and hostel, which served to accommodate students from more than 15 villages, as

well as the poor and disabled. Manish described the hardship of these people who weren't receiving any assistance from the government, but pointed out that the school had over 600 locals over the past two months come to try and help even if their son or daughter didn't go to school.

He said that "the unity was beautiful", but even with their help and solidarity "those kids that had lost their family or who were in an extremely poor



situation were sleeping on the floor, and skipping meals because the hostel couldn't afford to provide them lunch." Manish explained that "the students in the hostel reminded me of myself, and my friends in Scotland," this tore at Manish's heartstrings, and he decided to go for broke and give nearly everything he had, 50,000 Nepalese rupees (£420) to assist the students.

On the way back from Gurkha, however, Manish had an accident, and was injured and had to spend the rest of his savings on X-rays and medical treatment. Although he spent all of his savings, became

ill, and was injured he does not regret anything he did, and is grateful for the opportunity to help his native country, and frankly just to be back alive.

When Manish conveyed to me how much he appreciates, and wants to thank ELREC for organizing "such an amazing charity work" I could feel so much warmth and gratitude in his voice. He also said that he felt very blessed to have participated in the Cycle for Nepal challenge, where the team had a strong sense of togetherness and "everyone made him feel like part of his or her family."

Moreover, the Cycle for Nepal Challenge helped to raise around **£1500** in online and cash donations for the Nepal Scotland

Association. Indeed, everyone who organized the event, participated or donated should feel proud to have been a part of it, and to have contributed to such a worthy cause. Although the Cycle for Nepal Challenge was a great success, and the funds raised will go to assisting some of the most affected people in Nepal, the destruction from the earthquake has still left many populations and rural areas to fend for themselves. Manish insists that "even a little help means so much for [the people of Nepal]."

Volunteering to Achieve July update



From the Youth Development Officer

The YPAH group has also facilitated its first restorative justice program in North Edinburgh; it has been a great success and all the participants past the 5 week program. We hope to be doing more of these sessions in North Edinburgh and across Lothian's.



We've also set up the LGBT charter, promoting LGBT equality within ELREC and throughout the work we do. There have been two training sessions and two meetings of the charter group and I would like to thank everyone who attended.

Communities For Conservation Project

WANT TO REDUCE YOUR ENERGY BILLS?

Although the demand for our energy advice service is constantly increasing, the energy advice home visit service that we offer is still free and open to individuals from Chinese, South Asian, African and Polish backgrounds. Since April we have benefitted many households:

- We helped over 40 clients to reduce bills and stay in control of their bills by advising them to set online accounts with their supplier and submit meter readings to get accurate bills.
- We increased clients' confidence by phoning their energy supplier with them to discuss issues.
- We helped 5 dients to switch to a cheaper energy supplier.
- We advised dients on debt situation.
- We helped 2 dients to draught proof their old windows.
- We helped dients to switch from prepayment meters to normal meters.

As of now, we have referred 63 people to our partner Home Energy Scotland, conducted 49 joint visits with them, a third of which have qualified for measures including grants, income maximization, warm home discount, etc. Some of those measures have changed people's lives.

CASE STUDY:

"The heating system of this stone-built house was over 20 years old. The controls were located underneath the old fireplace so not the easiest to access. The client did not misuse the heating, she was always very conscious of rising bills so made sure the heating was used properly. But the house was not heating up properly and the energy bills were constantly high. The family were often cold during winter months. After a joint visit with Home Energy Scotland, the client qualified for the Energy Assistance Scheme and a technical survey was conducted. Things happened quickly from the initial referral to HES to an engineer coming out to do the survey and then installation. The boiler and all radiators were replaced at no cost to the client. The client is very happy with our service. She didn't believe she would get anything". Parveen Ishaq, Energy Advisor.

CLIMATE CHANGE AWARENESS



We screened the award winning documentary 'Just Eat It' and debated on the question "how to tackle the problem of food waste. A participant said: "this movie has changed my life: it showed how much waste there is out there. I'm even less fussy about use by date. I will urge people not to waste food." David Tai coordinated an excellent event to raise awareness of climate change amongst 30 people from Chinese background. The presentation on climate change was followed by an educative game on ranking electrical appliances.





The 15 pupils learnt in fun ways about how to be "greener", the importance of recycling, saving energy and reducing food waste. The classes encouraged children to discuss the topics and pass knowledge onto their peers.

We organized a family friendly environmental day at Corstorphine Hill in April with the gardening group from Drumbrae. Well attended by parents and children, the session was much enjoyed. Children went off in groups

with their parents in a scavenger hunt for natural materials. They brought the materials back and shared what they had found. Our community gardener explained somethings about each natural object. After returning to the community

centre, the group cooked up nettle soup, and made some wild garlic pesto. Everybody learnt plenty, adults and



children.



The client is an elderly Chinese man living alone in his three bedrooms flat. His only source of income is his Pension Credit. Due to years of financial difficulties, seldom has the client turned the heaters on even when it snowed in winter. During winter, to minimise his bills and because his home was too cold, the client would go to the library or the shopping mall during the day to warm himself up. After the library and the shopping mall closed, he was forced to go to McDonald's or KFC for a shelter. When both restaurants were closed, the client stayed home unwillingly. Due to the weather condition in winter, he was always uncomfortable and sometimes ill. David Tai conducted a home visit at the client's home, and discovered a cold flat, an old heating system and draughty windows. We immediately referred the client onto Home Energy Scotland to find out whether the client would be eligible for any grants to improve his home. David and Elaine Benzies went to the client's home for a second home visit. After several checks, the client successfully qualified to the Energy Assistance Scheme. A few months later, the client had a brand new heating system, and loft insulation installed at no cost. After the improvement, the client always stayed at home and enjoyed his warm home. The client is very grateful for the help from David and Home Energy Scotland.

Youth Zone

Hello, my name is Gabriela Lobo and I am the new Youth Zone Coordination here at ELREC. The Youth Zone is a new project that aims to reach BME young people in Edinburgh and Lothians. We want to provide a safe and fun environment where they can 1) discuss current and relevant issues, 2) build self-trust, confidence and self-esteem and, 3) develop skills and abilities that will enable them to find employment or enter a higher education programme.



The rational for this project came from the evident need in Edinburgh from a young group directed specifically for BME youth. The Edinburgh Youth Social Inclusion Partnership wrote that in 2003 there were few youth groups for the BME community, that 54% of BME youths had never been a part of a youth group while 52% believed that while there were lots of youth activities in Edinburgh they felt that they "were not for them".

Additionally, in 2011, a report made by the Joseph Rowntree Foundation, highlighted the fact that there is a pattern of lower educational attainment, poor conversion from education to employment rates, and seclusion within many BME communities in Scotland. Equally, The Scottish Government observed that this group of young people participated less in particular apprenticeships and mainstream youth projects across Edinburgh.

In an attempt to encourage this group of young people to participate in their community and motivate them into taking the next step into adulthood, we are creating this space. The project is being developed as we speak and we hope to be able to open our doors to them at the beginning of September, 2015.

Additionally, I appreciate the warm welcome and constant support I have received from everyone at ELREC and want to welcome anyone who has any questions or suggestions in relation to the Youth Zone project to contact me at any point.



Barrier of Poverty and Inequality

Hi all! My name is Hannah Lawrence and I have joined ELREC as the Research Assistant of the Barriers of Poverty and Equality Project. I am from North Carolina but have been a student in the UK since 2012, so I feel more British than American these days!

Since I have only just joined the ELREC family and started work on this fantastic project, I have mostly been playing catch up. Nonetheless, the wheels of the project are spinning and we are so excited about the big plans in the works. This is not a new project at ELREC, so many of



you may be familiar with our objectives. But in short, we are trying to identify why Pakistani, Bangladeshi, and African communities (more than any other communities in Edinburgh) are continuously experiencing high levels of poverty. There have been many enlightening reports and studies attempting to understand the underlying causes of this phenomenon—in fact, our project is based on one such report by the Joseph Rowntree Foundation. But the reason that our project is necessary is because most of the previous reports have been based predominantly upon quantitative data, leaving some significant gaps in our understanding (and therefore ability to help solve the problem). Therefore, our report will be primarily *qualitative*, to see if we can shed some insightful light on the issues by reaching out to the communities in person. Which brings me to my next point—what are we up to now?

Currently we are designing a survey to distribute to these communities—it asks questions and tackles topics and themes typically unexplored. It will be the statistical foundation of our qualitative structure. This structure will be built out of case studies (by conducting indepth interviews), and multiple focus groups, with discussion topics tailored to each community. So the recruitment of participants for these three modes of analysis is the next big undertaking. I would be overjoyed to welcome volunteers from these three communities—with their unique insight and, perhaps, language skills, this project would benefit greatly. With that said, I look forward to working with *all* of those willing to give their time to such an amazing project and wonderful communities!

If you or anyone you know is interested in attending a focus group (with refreshments and great discussions!), participating in an in-depth interview (carried out flexibly via phone, skype, or in person), or filling out a survey (the survey will be digitized for simpler dissemination very soon), then please contact me at hlawrence@elrec.org.uk. The contribution of the public's time, knowledge, and/or community contacts is integral to the success of this project!

As for the ELREC community, I have received such a warm welcome this past week and so I want to say a big thank you to everyone that has gone out of their way to offer help or simply just say hello. What a fantastic organization to work with!






True Colours newsletter update - July



The Electoral Registration Officer has launched the updating of The Register of Electors across Edinburgh and the Lothians. Household Enquiry Forms are being delivered to all households across the area from 3 August. Only one person in the household needs to complete this form. It can be completed/updated by going to www.elecreg.co.uk/lothian-vjb and entering the security codes printed on the form.



People are able to vote in Scottish Parliamentary and Local Government elections when they are 16 and over, and in UK Parliamentary and European Parliamentary elections when they are 18 and over.

As 16 and 17 year olds can now vote in Scottish Parliamentary and Local Government elections we need details of: -

- · 14 year olds that will turn 15 by 30 November 2015
- Those aged 15 and over

Young persons will be included on the register and able to vote when they become old enough.

NEW VOTER REGISTRATION

New electors will also need to register individually which can be done online at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote or by telephoning 0131 344 2500 between 9am and 5pm Monday to Friday. Registration only takes a couple of minutes but you need your national insurance number and date of birth to complete an application.



A devastating earthquake in over 80 years ripped through Nepal on the 25th of this April, with a death

toll of over 9000 (and sharply rising). Around 18 people have been reportedly killed by the worst ever Mount Everest avalanche disaster with hundreds injured and being rescued, 2 people at a time using high altitude helicopters.
