Edinburgh Slavery and Colonialism Legacy Review group to present recommendations

- The Council publicly acknowledges the city's past role in sustaining slavery and colonialism, and issues an apology to those places and people who suffered.
- Statues, monuments, buildings and street names associated with slavery and colonialism in Edinburgh are retained and re-presented in accordance with a new, dedicated interpretation strategy which explains the nature and consequences of that involvement.
- City-wide observance of the annual, UNESCO-designated International Day for the Remembrance of the Slave Trade and its Abolition every August 23 is introduced and resourced.
- Teaching and learning materials are developed and delivered to fill the gap in respect of Scotland's and Edinburgh's role in slavery and colonialism
- Friendship agreements are initiated with cities in countries most impacted by Edinburgh's historic involvement with slavery and colonialism.
- Universities and research bodies are encouraged to fund, develop and publish studies into the many under-researched aspects of Edinburgh's connections with slavery and colonialism, prioritising the objectives of the new interpretation strategy.
- A significant public artwork is commissioned acknowledging Edinburgh's links with slavery and colonialism. This initiates the development of a city-wide strategy for public art that fairly represents the diversity of the city and its histories, and capitalises on the creative potential of a multi-cultural city.
- A positive programme of cultural commissions is established, empowering and resourcing emerging Black and Minority Ethnic creatives in Edinburgh to participate in and shape existing festivals, arts and heritage programmes.
- The Council endorses the work of the Empire, Slavery and Scotland's Museums steering group (ESSM) established by the Scottish Government, and commits to exploring how the capital can contribute to the creation of a dedicated space addressing Scotland's role in this history.
- An independent legacy stakeholder group is established, supported by the Council, to ensure approved recommendations are actioned, resourced and monitored, and progress is reported annually

Professor Sir Geoff Palmer chaired the Groups that produced the Report and Recommendations. He is also the Honorary President of ELREC.

Police Scotland – Message to Communities



Police in Edinburgh have been engaging with Universities and Colleges in the lead up to this year's fresher's events. Student safety, hate crime awareness and crime prevention advice will be distributed to students prior to and after the event.

Discussions are being held with local authority in South West Edinburgh and elsewhere in the city to roll out Keep Safe and Third Party Reporting training in all libraries to enhance community support to people who become victims of hate crime.

Edinburgh Division's Prevention, Intervention & Partnerships department assisted the School Link Officer at Portobello High School with inputs on hate crime.

Following recent engagement in relation to hate crime and supporting our diverse communities at Edinburgh Hindu Mandir, officers were invited to attend there to celebrate Raksha Bandhan. This served to reinforce the relationship with Edinburgh's Hindu community and further built on the confidence and trust they have in Police Scotland. This event was attended by Leith Community policing Team and Equality & Diversity officers from the Prevention, Intervention & Partnerships department.

Edinburgh Division officers were delighted to travel to Airdrie where they met the LGBT Youth Scotland Charter Manager and handed over our extensive portfolio of evidence. This is now being assessed to determine whether or not the division has met the criteria to be awarded the LGBT Youth Scotland Charter.

An Equality & Diversity officers from the Prevention, Intervention & Partnerships department joined a School Link Officer to meet with school pupils involved in hate incidents within their schools. Along with their parents the officers met a group and emphasised the seriousness of hate crime, the significant victim impact and that Police Scotland take a zero tolerance approach to hate crime. This meeting appeared successful in that the perpetrators appreciated how their behaviour was unacceptable and significantly impacted the victim's quality of life. It further evidenced Police Scotland's approach to dealing with hate crime and reassured parents and schools of the response they can expect.

Free Edinburgh Fringe Show Tickets

The Edinburgh Festival Fringe is one of the greatest celebrations of arts and culture on the planet, and a unique platform for creative freedom. Every year in August, performers come from all over the world to showcase their work in Edinburgh.

Aiming to make everyone to feel part of the Fringe, particularly local audiences who might otherwise be unable to attend, the Children and Young People (CYP) ticketing scheme has been launched in 2014, with tickets generously donated by Fringe artists and companies as a thank you to the people of Edinburgh for hosting the festival.

We have been extra lucky this year to get access to CYP fringe tickets for the children of the women we support, to see shows at the Edinburgh Festival this August. We have allocated over 60 tickets so far. Children have had great time going to see the shows wit their mums and very grateful for the opportunity.

SOMRA Led by Mitra Rostami

SOMRA is ELREC's ERASMUS+ funded multinational project. We manage a team of project partners in 5 European countries (Austria, Cyprus, Finland, Ireland, and Portugal). SOMRA's focus is the occupation of migrants and refugees in environmental activities at an entrepreneurial level.



In June, we organised an event, as part of the Scottish Refugee Festival week, under the title of "Hand-made Stories" and with the theme of Migrants & Upcycling.



In run-up to the event, we organised a series of upcycling craft workshops, through which our service users explored upcycling options and gave recycled material a second life as a beautiful hand-made craft. The workshops were fun and creative.



Over 70 people visited our event which showcased art and craft work done by our service users from migrant and refugee backgrounds, using recycled materials. We also ran interactive stalls, run by our service users, including clothes repair, hand reflexology, and upcycle craft. All the visitors found the event informative and worthwhile.

We hosted SOMRA's Transnational Partner Meeting on the 20th of June with representatives from all partner organisations participating in Edinburgh. The meeting took place at the Urban Room provided to us by the Edinburgh Neighbouhood project, run by the University of Edinburgh in a fantastic location just on Prince's street.

BAME RECAP

ELREC RECAP Project has had an exciting time over the last quarter. A range of events, workshops and activities carried out over the summer.

Multicultural Eid Party:

We hosted a multicultural Eid party event on 22 May 2022 at the Leith Community and Education Centre. Over 50 people from BME families attended the event. Our chief guest Foysol Choudhury MBE MSP welcomed the participants and **FI RFC** mentioned activities has undertaken during the Covid-19 pandemic. He thanked the funder for the BAME-RECAP project. This event provided an opportunity to get together among the families who had been isolated due to Covid-19 restrictions. People enjoyed music, recitation, games and various fun activities at the party.



Support and Advice Service:

During our weekly surgeries, we have given essential support and advice to the BME individual and families who were affected by Covid-19. The day-long surgery at the ELREC office is conducted every Wednesday. About 10 people People from different languages group such as Arabic, Chinese, Bengali, Urdu and Somalian, have taken the service with the help of an interpreter. The service has proven to be very popular and in high demand across the BME communities.



BME Women Walking Group:

We hosted a female walking group between May and June 2022. The 'Let's Walk Together' group was supported by a female support worker and run over four weeks. BME female from mix age group took part at the walking group. The group decided different walking paths in each week to walk.



Workshop with BME Elderly people:

We have hosted two workshops with local BME elderly people. These workshops took place on 24/07/2022 and 28/08/2022 in the ELREC meeting room. Most of the elderly people migrated to Scotland recently, thus we provided information about their rights at the workshop. ELREC-RECAP project has helped elderly people to signpost or access different services run by other organisations in Edinburgh and Lothian.

BAME - RECAP project ends in August 2022. We would like to thank the Global Majority Fund, financed by Comic Relief in partnership with the National Emergencies Trust (NET), supports this project. In Scotland, CRER is an Intermediary Partner for Comic Relief's Global Majority Fund.

Bangladeshi COP 26 Delegates visit ELREC

A COP 26 delegates from the Centre for Natural Resource Studies (CNRS) based in Dhaka, Bangladesh, visited ELREC on 10 November 2021 at 11.30 am. The delegate team led by professor Akhter Hussain from the University of Dhaka, chair of CNRS board, Dr M Mokhlesur Rahman, Executive Director of CNRS and M. Anisul Islam, Director of CNRS.

ELREC Chair Foysol Choudhury MBE MSP welcomed the delegate at ELREC and gave a brief about ELREC's work in improving society and the environment. ELREC Communities for Conservation (CfC) Project Coordinator Jean Matthew highlighted his project's key activities and success to reduce carbon and save energy in an urban setting across Edinburgh.

CNRS executive director Mokhlesur Rahman appreciate the activities carried out by ELREC-CfC, such as swap shop, upcycling and sewing club. Mr Rahman hoped that these models could be replicated elsewhere in the world to save the planet.

CNRS is a Bangladeshi NGO that works to restore wetland natural resources across Bangladesh's inland and coastal regions. They are hoping to undertake initiatives within the urban areas to mitigate the impact of climate change in Bangladesh. CNRS is keen to collaborate in the future with a like-minded partner organisation in Scotland like ELREC CfC.

Green Leith Art is a six month project that started in April this year. The project aims to make communities feel more connected and less isolated, connect them with nature and boost their creativity. This was achieved through providing weekly art workshops as well as weekly walks in the green areas around Leith.

Art Workshops

More than 20 art workshops were provided during the past few months with participnts from different cultures and backgrounds. The participants enjoyed learning new artistic skills with our artist Majid. They created beautiful paintings and art work and enjoyed socialising, sharing and having a cuppa!

One participant shares her experience in the workshop: 'the workhshop is the best part of my day, getting creative is a great way of letting out all the stress of work. I love connecting with everyone too'.

Sarah, who's been a committed volunteer in the workshop expressed her thoughts about her experience saying: 'I love coming and helping here, it feels great to be able to connect with people, help them feel welcome and encourage them to get creative. At the same time, it is a good way for me to have some time for myself and relax'.

Also, a refugee participant said that: 'the art workshop is the one and only opportunity that my family accessed since we came to Edinburgh in 2020, we are grateful to have found an activity to connect with other people and learn from them '.

Wellbeing walks

CEITHCHOOSES

So far, 20 different wellbeing walks took place in different green spaces in and around Leith, we enjoyed exploring the beauty of the Botanic Gardnes, London road gardens, Calton Hill, Leith Links and Inverleith Park in the past few months.

To reach out to as many isolated families as possible, we collaborated with two different groups from Multi-Cultural Family Base and organised a few different walks with these groups. More than 15 mums and their children from African, Asian, South American and other communities took part in our walks; the majority of them are 'stay at home' mums who don't have opportunities to get out due to many barriers. Walks to Leith Links, The Royal Botanic gardens and Calton Hill were organised with the mums, where they got the chance to learn about many plants, trees, historical places and community gardens in both Leith Links and the Botanics.



One mum said: 'I don't usually go out, I was encouraged to join the walk as thought it's a great opportunity to connect with other mums who have the same issues that I do, also to explore Edinburgh more as I've been here for more than 3 years without getting the chance to see anything. Walking in Calton hill was great and I will definitely come back with my family'.

Another mum expressed her excitement about joining the walks saying: 'as a full-time carer, I don't get the chance to go out or spend time with people, the walk was a great opportunity for me to breathe, connect with people and explore the beautiful nature in Edinburgh'.

At the start of the summer break, we organised a big family walk in collaboration with Linknet, this was to give the chance to as many people from the most isolated communities to exprole the beauty of the Roya Botanic Gardens. More than 40 people joined the walk; families enjoyed the sun, connecting with other families, exploring the green space of the Botanics and learning about the many different herbs that they can grow at home and sharing organic snacks.

One of the participants said: 'this is the best start of the school holiday, I can't believe I never been here before, I will come back very often now to recharge in this green gem'.

We also ended the school holidays with another walk at the Botanics, when we explored some plants and species in more depth through going to an exhibition there. Our participatnts enjoyed learning about Salmon breeding and building the intertidal commons in Scotland and how mussels are beinng used now to produce alternative building materials, which was a great example of using food waste in re-creating useful things. The exhibition also represented some plants which is grwon in Palestine and showed case how environmentalism often manifests as a tool of political enclousure there. The exhibition Recalling Recollection, explored this and showed case a connection between this and the Scottish Highlands.

The participants were facitanted by what they learned and said that they felt they travelled to different green places around the world during the tour.

REDUCE, REUSE & RECYCLE



In March 2022, the Communities' Reduce Reuse & Recycle project started. The aim of the project is to encourage and support BAME communities in Edinburgh to reduce waste, increase reusing and repairing and to shift to a more sustainable consumption. Overall, we will change attitude, behaviours and awareness towards waste and consumption through activities including:

- Clothing repairs and alterations sessions
- Sewing/stitching classes
- Swap Shop events
- Fashion shows
- Food parcel distribution to vulnerable families
- Cookery sessions
- DIY upcycling
- 'Composting' and 'wormery' workshops
- Visits to recycling centers
- Edinburgh Climate Festival

We work with the Polish, South Asian, Chinese and African communities based on ELREC's long established relationships with the communities and their higher demographic representation in Edinburgh.

Food Growing

The gardening sessions have been happening every 2 weeks at the Edinburgh Royal Botanic Garden, participants learned many things including composting techniques, seed sowing using recycled materials, after care – watering and planting out, how to grow in small spaces, and much more.

In addition to this, we have a brand-new plot on Lauriston Agroecology Farm and meet every Thursday at 2.30pm. We need help preparing the beds in time for planting organic vegetables in March 2023. We are using the 'no dig' method, which means smothering the weeds, especially couch grass, with thick cardboard and manure. There will be an opportunity to learn organic/permaculture techniques, help plan next year's crops and meet a friendly, diverse group of plot-holders. Cold drinks will be provided and there will be time to relax and enjoy the wonderful views. A special thank you to our volunteer Sam who is the volunteer lead of the plot.

Sewing Club

The sewing club has been very busy, the participants have been learning how to repair their clothes as well as how to create new items out of clothes scraps and different materials.



The team has been running numerous upcycling workshops such as macrame and upcycling techniques and we will be making candle jars to take home, Making pots out of the cans and containers, reducing reusing & recycling, food waste, brooch-making climate awareness and much more.





Food support

We have been supplying food for approximately 35 families and diverting 300kg of food from going to the landfill weekly. Thank you our partner Fare Share, to the National Lottery Fund Climate Action to our dedicated team of volunteers.
