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# SUMMARY

The Edinburgh Climate Festival 2025 was a free, family-friendly, community-led event held at the Meadows on Saturday 28<sup>th</sup> June 2025, running from 12–7pm and drawing an estimated 6,000 attendees.

This year's theme, Root and Rise, highlighted the importance of grounding ourselves in nature and well-being to build resilience and inspire collective climate action. By reconnecting with ourselves and the earth, we can rise stronger, embrace sustainable habits, and drive systemic change.

## **2025 IMPROVEMENTS**

### Sustainability

This year, ECF featured a stage constructed entirely from reused materials, aligning with the festival's commitment to sustainability. The stage was provided by Reset Scenery, using reclaimed elements from the creative industry, repurposed for a new use. To reflect the festival's Root and Rise theme, the stage was decorated with natural materials such as trees, branches, and ivy, creating an immersive and environmentally conscious setting.

The festival also piloted new initiatives aimed at reducing waste and improving overall sustainability practices.

One key initiative was the introduction of an additional fee on single-use packaging, implemented by all food vendors. To further promote waste reduction, the festival launched a free raffle to encourage attendees to bring their own containers. Participants who opted for reusable items were entered into a prize draw, with prizes valued at £60, £50, and £40, rewarding their commitment to sustainable behaviour.

Another initiative focused on active travel and renewable energy. Prizes were awarded to individuals who cycled the most and contributed to powering the stage and sound system through pedal power, highlighting the connection between sustainable transport and clean energy.

### **Accessibility**

This year, ECF enhanced its on-site support by clearly identifying festival helpers in yellow or orange hi-vis vests and centrally locating a fully staffed Information Tent. Dedicated Accessibility Volunteers were available throughout the day to assist attendees with specific needs. Key accessibility features, including accessible toilets, were highlighted on a site map provided both online and at the event. Additionally, free Sensory Packs (including ear defenders, fidgets, and eye shades) were offered, either through advance booking or on a first-come basis. An online Accessibility Request Form was made available to ensure tailored support for attendees.



### Actions for Next Year – Sustainability Focus

### -Energy Use:

The pedal-powered stage was a major success in reducing energy emissions and will be retained next year. Fortunately, only a few food vendors used diesel or petrol generators this year. For future events, we aim to eliminate the use of generators entirely. Where power is necessary, we will strongly encourage vendors to use biodiesel or other sustainable energy alternatives.

#### -Waste Reduction:

We will continue to promote our reusable container initiative by advertising the packaging fee programme earlier and more widely. The goal is to increase the number of attendees who bring their own containers, thereby reducing waste emissions on the day.

#### -Transport Emissions:

Transport was the largest source of emissions this year. To address this, we will increase efforts to encourage attendees to carpool, take public transport, cycle, or walk to the festival. Clearer travel guidance and sustainable transport incentives will be explored as part of our outreach strategy.
